

Dear Pearl City Parents, Guardians and Community,

The Pearl City School District is proud to announce that the Pearl City High School has earned a 2023 Annual Summative Designation of <u>Exemplary</u> from the Illinois State Board of Education. An Exemplary designation indicates that a school is in the highest performing 10 percent of schools in the State. Exemplary is the highest designation awarded to a school. This year's report card shows a graduation rate of 97% (2022 was 87%) as well as an improvement in 9th grade students on track with their coursework from 86% to 93%. The high school also did not have any subgroup fall below the "all students" group of the lowest-performing 5 percent of schools.

We are also proud to share that the Middle School and Elementary School received an annual summative designation of <u>Commendable</u> on the Illinois State Report Card. This summative designation is the second highest that is awarded in the State. The Middle School performed 11% higher in English Language Arts and 15% higher in Math on the state assessment scores from last year. The elementary outperformed the state on their state assessment by 9% in Math and did not have any underperforming groups at or below the "all students" group of the lowest-performing 5 percent of schools in the state.

A school's annual summative designation describes how well an individual school is meeting the needs of all its students. The designations recognize schools with strong overall performance across a range of academic and student success indicators. Academic indicators make up 75% of a school designation (ELA and Math Growth; ELA and Math Proficiency; Science proficiency; English Learner Progress to Proficiency; Graduation rate). School quality and student success makes up the other 25% of the designation (Chronic Absenteeism; Climate Survey; 9th graders on track to graduate).

This year's District 2023 report card is a direct reflection of the hard work and effort put forth by our students, parents, teachers and administration over the past year. The top Exemplary designation for the high school and the Commendable designations for the Middle School and Elementary schools accurately reflects the high culture of academic excellence that we strive for in the Pearl City School District.

Over the past five years the school district has made changes to many areas of the school district. The district has purchased and revised its curriculum, updated the technology in all aspects of the district, retained and hired educators that continue to adapt and put students first, focused on training to help students with social and emotional struggles, and recently has added a tiered learning system to help all levels of learners

The educators in the Pearl City School District will continue to strive to receive high designation status, to do what is best for all students and to inspire in everyone a passion to excel.

RESOLUTION REGARDING ESTIMATED AMOUNTS NECESSARY TO BE LEVIED FOR THE YEAR 2023

WHEREAS, the *Truth in Taxation Law* requires that all taxing districts in the State of Illinois determine the estimated amounts of taxes necessary to be levied for the year not less than twenty (20) days prior to the official adoption of the aggregate tax levy of the district; and

WHEREAS, if the estimated aggregate amount necessary to be levied, exclusive of election costs and bond and interest costs, does not exceed 105% of the aggregate amount of property taxes extended or estimated to be extended, including any amount abated by the taxing district prior to such extension, upon the levy of the preceding year, public notice shall be given and a public hearing shall be held on the district's intent to adopt a tax levy in an amount which is less than 105% of such extension or estimated extension for the preceding year; and

WHEREAS, the aggregate amount of property taxes extended for the bond and interest purposes for 2022 was \$106,163; and it is hereby determined that the estimated amount of taxes to be levied for bond and interest purposes for 2023 is \$104,766.48.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Board of Education, Pearl City Community Unit School District No. 200, Counties of Stephenson, Jo Daviess, and Carroll, State of Illinois, as follows:

Section 1: The aggregate amount of taxes estimated to be levied for the year 2022 was \$2,915,923.

Section 2: The aggregate amount of taxes estimated to be levied for the year 2023 does exceed 105% of the taxes extended by district in the year 2022.

Section 3: Public notice shall be given in the <u>The Journal Standard</u>, being a newspaper of general circulation in said district, and a public hearing shall be held, all in the manner and time prescribed in said notice, which notice shall be published not more than 14 days nor less than 7 days prior to said hearing, and shall be not less than 1/8 page in size, with no smaller than twelve (12) point, enclosed in a black border not less than 1/4 inch wide and in substantially the following form:

I. A public hearing to approve a proposed property tax increase for Pearl City Community Unit School District No. 200 for 2023 will be held on December 13, 2023 at 6:20 p.m. in the high school Library, 100 S. Summit, Pearl City, Illinois.

II. The corporate and special purpose property taxes extended or abated for the year 2022 were \$ 2,915,923.

The proposed corporate and special purpose property taxes to be levied for 2023 are \$3,122,330. This represents a 8.73% increase over the previous year.

III. The property taxes extended for debt service and public building commission leases for 2022 were \$106,163.

The estimated property taxes to be levied for debt service and public building commission leases for 2023 are \$104,766.48. This represents a decrease over the previous year.

IV. The total property taxes extended or abated for 2022 were \$3,022,086.

The estimated total property taxes to be levied for 2023 are \$3,227,096.48 This represents an 8.73% increase over the previous year.
